Getting ready to start today's city council mtg. It's a dense agenda, the last thing on the calendar is the EAP, it could be switched tho I doubt it. EAP is last, also Lee will break the tie on proposed council rules of procedure, always lengthy bid items...25 items on consent

Meeting has begun. Ramachandran is absent, recent items that have happened...pulling item 10...should be coming back in January. "it is my intention if I have a second, and vote...we will not be hearing EAP today. And full intention it will be coming back"

Apparently, after several changes, Cal ICH still doesn't think the "where do they go part" is sufficient. "Cal ICH has some questions about sensitivity zones, so where people can go where they are unsheltered...."

Houston states that he thought that his EAP current version had responded to all the ICH issues. Jenkins responds "I did receive an email yesterday citing concerns from ICH"

Welp, scratch my first take on how long this meeting will go. It will be considerably more thrifty on the clock without the EAP deliberation. Speakers are still required to have time to speak if they like

On the vote to pull the item, Houston was the only no vote. There was a round of applause as it was pulled. [The significant changes made obviously to conform with ICH were not enough. If I had to guess, it's the incomprehensible map, or the language of the "temp stability zones]

B. Low-Sensitivity Areas

All City property not explicitly designated as high-sensitivity areas shall be treated as low-sensitivity areas, where the City does not automatically prohibit encampments. These locations may serve as temporary stability zones when residents are not yet connected to shelter or housing, and where no immediate public safety risk exists.

One of the most significant and enduring critiques from ICH on Houston's language in the EAP is that homeless have to be allowed to go somewhere in the city where they won't face eviction. There has to be somewhere to go.

Here's the OO report on the EAP, which was significantly changed to satisfy ICH critiques, but still not enough, per Jenkins' comments oakland-observer.ghost.io/changes-to-hom...

"Low-Sensitivity Zones" Now Explicitly Areas Where Encampments Are Nominally Allowed

Many changes in the new EAP are almost certainly a reflection of the ICH guidance that require cities to allow geographic areas where homeless residence is nominally allowed. The new policy has pivoted from its approach to high- and low-sensitivity locations, for example. "Low-Sensitivity Areas" are considered to be any area that is not categorized as "High-Sensitivity," but the new text makes it clear the City must designate "Low Sensitivity" areas as locations where the homeless can find respite from encampment closures. The original EAP had described these areas as subject to closure, but with a lower priority, but they are now called "temporary stability zones" in the new text with the assumption that encampments in those areas will not be pursued for closure if they meet criteria in health and safety evaluations.

The EAP's "High-Sensitivity" areas are similar to the list in the EMP rubric that includes parks, critical infrastructure, areas where children play or are educated, but with new EAP additions that are more explicitly defined—a broad set of criteria would require encampments to have a smaller footprint and conform better to ADA requirements, among other restrictions.

B. Low-Sensitivity Areas


All City property not explicitly designated as high-sensitivity areas shall be treated as low-sensitivity areas, where the City does not automatically prohibit encampments. These locations may serve as temporary stability zones when residents are not yet connected to shelter or housing, and where no immediate public safety risk exists.

In these areas, the City may permit encampments to remain provided they do not pose emergency or urgent health and safety conditions and if they meet minimum health, safety, and access standards, as outlined below. These standards ensure basic access, emergency response capability, and fire prevention, while upholding dignity for individuals who have not yet been offered shelter or housing.

Staffer explaining that the baseline is for the same time period in 2025, if TOT increases more than \$300K, the \$300K will be shared with Roots, and anything over that is kept by Oakland in the agreement. Roughly cost-neutral

"Give me some of what you're smoking" says commenter Hazard. [I think a lot of people are overlooking its an essentially cost neutral investment, if the hotel stays don't emerge, then there's no additional revenue, and no sharing]

7 ayes, the Roots TOT tax sharing agreement passed, with Houston voted no.

On to the Montclair BID, report and assessment levy, with 5% increase this year.

AT THE NOVEMBER 4, 2025 CITY COUNCIL MEETING, COUNCILMEMBER RAMACHANDRAN MADE A MOTION, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER UNGER TO APPROVE AS AMENDED; WITH THE AMENDMENT TO CANCEL THE REQUIRING MAJORITY VOTE TO TAKE AN ITEM OFF OF CONSENT TO

Generally, these ties are made with knowledge that the Mayor will be available and plans to break the tie, but it's not clear that's happened here.

Lee's staffer came down and stated: "Mayor requested me to come down that she does not intend to vote on...defers to city council on their own rules, and therefore will not be voting today."

Odd that this was scheduled without Lee's confirming she planned to break the vote. Jenkins is seeking a vote to suspend votes of procedure, to hear the item again tonight.

OCA: "suspend a portion of Rule 29...which provides that in a tie, that item will be automatically continued to the next regular meeting solely for the Mayor to cast the vote"

This is more of the Council's improper scheduling, smh...public would have had no expectation that this would be discussed today, under normal rules. Jenkins says that the findings of necessity would be that the next agenda is impacted

Gallo, Fife and Houston voted no, and the motion failed because it needs six votes.

Jenkins restated another motion to suspend, he says, "just to talk about it..." Clerk and City Attorney clarifying that this could end in a vote, not just discussion. It looks like they could actually talk about it without the suspension, actually


The vote went down the same way, 5 votes, but 6 necessary. [IMO this is extremely disrespectful to the public]

Public speakers on the rules of procedure. I will note that per Jenkins, OPD was requested to escort Hazard out of the room for contesting the process.


Nicole Dean says that the new rules would make the meetings even harder for working people to come, and in a moment of shrinking democracy, this would prevent the public from participating

JR asks if they can move to continue the item to the next Council meeting, JR moves to schedule to 12/16 on non consent, Jenkins seconds. Fife: "I'm confused, I thought the next meeting was impacted..."

Fife, Houston, and Gallo again voted no, but this only required a vote of 5. Fife also complained about how many times the item has failed, and how convoluted its become.

Now on to the EAP, which has been withdrawn, but the public is allowed to speak on the item. Clerk, "we have 131 speakers signed up to speak on this item"...to applause from the audience

Jenkins allowed BART Commissioner Victor Flores to have more time and to go first, then Houston asked Flores to come back and explain whether he was for "more high sensitivity zones'. Flores says he was looking for more clear language




